ANTI BULLYING PLAN 2021 IRRAWANG HIGH SCHOOL

Bullying behaviour has three key features. It involves the intentional misuse of power in a relationship. It is ongoing and repeated, and it involves behaviours that can cause harm. The NSW Department of Education requires all NSW public schools to have an Anti-bullying Plan which details the strategies implemented to reduce student bullying behaviours.

Irrawang High School's commitment

Our school rejects all forms of bullying behaviours, including online (or cyber) bullying by maintaining a commitment to providing a safe, inclusive and respectful learning community that promotes student wellbeing. Executive staff are committed to establishing evidence-based approaches and strategies that promote a positive climate where bullying is less likely to occur.

1 School culture and inclusion

All members of the school community are active participants in building a welcoming school culture that values diversity and fosters positive relationships. A key component of a supportive school culture is building respectful relationships and an ethos that bullying is not accepted, in both online and offline environments. School staff will actively respond to student bullying behaviour.

Our school engages in the following practices to promote a positive school culture.

1.1 Student assemblies

Student bullying and expectations about student behaviour will be discussed and information presented to promote a positive school culture where bullying is not accepted.

1.2 Staff communication and professional learning

Staff will be supported with professional learning that provides evidence-based ways to encourage and teach positive social and emotional wellbeing and discourage, prevent, identify, and respond effectively to student bullying behaviour.

1.3 New and casual staff

New and casual staff will be informed about our school's approaches and strategies to prevent and respond to student bullying behaviour in the following ways.

PBL Behaviour Management Plans and PBL procedures are provided in a folder and handout when they enter on duty.

Staff also receive a Staff Induction Handbook which summarises the key areas and makes reference to the PBL procedures and practises that are the school's approaches and strategies to prevent and respond to student bullying behaviour.

The Head Teacher of the Key Learning Areas, support new and casual staff when they enter for duty at the school in regards to PBL Behaviour Management Plans and PBL procedures in regards to strategies preventing and responding to bullying behaviour.

The Principal speaks to new executive staff when they enter for duty at school as part of the induction process.


2 Partnerships with families and community

3 Support for wellbeing and positive behaviours

Our school's practices support student wellbeing and positive behaviour approaches that align with our school community's needs.

Social and emotional skills related to personal safety, resilience, help-seeking and protective behaviours are explicitly taught across the curriculum in Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE).

Examples of other ways our school will embed student wellbeing and positive behaviour approaches and strategies in practices include the following.

Our school is a Positive Behaviour for Learning school. PBL makes use of the framework approach of providing universal, targeted and intensive support strategies for students and staff. PBL utilises data to identify areas of behaviour that need addressing and systems and practices provide a program of strategies that reinforce positive values in behaviour in classrooms with a corresponding improvement in learning across the school.

At Irrawang High School, we aim to build high expectation relationships between students, staff, parents/carers and community members through community PBL and in partnership with our partner public schools.
